Over 30 folks toured GPC's Beards Cove project on September 11 to get a look at the restored shoreline and native plantings. This sneak peek offered GPC members and our Beards Cove Community Organization (BCCO) neighbors an opportunity to talk with GPC staff, project engineer ESA Inc., and Beards Cove community leaders about this joint project to restore the shoreline to its original condition, while enjoying breathtaking views of Hood Canal. "We couldn't be happier with the restoration and proud to be a part of salmon recovery in Hood Canal," remarked Louie Yelverton, BCCO Board President. "The shoreline is so beautiful and to watch the birds and fish return to the salt marsh is amazing." The project was funded by over \$1M in grants from RCO Salmon Recovery Program and EPA Marine and Nearshore Program.

community organizer for fish. In his work with the Suquamish Tribe to restore natural salmon runs to Kitsap streams, Paul has spent 38 years inspiring children and adults to care about salmon and their freshwater and marine environments.

When GPC honored Paul with our Conservation Award for his incredible contribution to restoring salmon and their habitats during our Spring Dinner, our 350 guests were asked how many had participated in a beach seine, hatchery tour, or another activity led by Paul. The room became a sea of hands.

What is truly outstanding about Paul's work both for the Suquamish Tribe and with the community is his persistent effort to protect and restore the environment, and to involve as many people as possible in the process. GPC congratulates Paul on his many achievements in fish conservation.
